## Our work and impact

CBM works with local partners to deliver large-scale healthcare programmes and provide specialist support for people with disabilities, their families and communities. Last year, alongside our local partners, we reached **3,800,317 people** including...



2,465,808

people were treated and protected from Neglected Tropical Diseases in areas where they are identified as a public health problem.



1,113,034

people accessed essential eye care services and thousands of people were able to see again.



5,653

people were supported with the skills and equipment they needed to build and sustain their livelihoods.



3,725

people with mental health conditions accessed the treatment and support they need.



1,880

children were supported to go to school and build a brighter future.

# Preventing blindness and saving sight

Worldwide, three out of four people who are blind don't need to be, and over one billion live with a visual impairment that could be treated or prevented. Our work helps people access eye care to prevent and treat blinding conditions, while also training and equipping local eye health professionals for lasting impact.

Our See the Way Malawi project, a three-year initiative in partnership with the Malawi Network for Elderly Persons Organisations (MANEPO) and the Nkhoma Eye Programme, concluded in 2024. We delivered 6,652 cataract surgeries and provided outpatient care to 166,186 people across 10 district hospitals.

We met Dorothy in 2022, after three years of living with cataracts. Her family was unsure about surgery, but her granddaughter Evelyn arranged a bicycle taxi to take her to CBM-supported Nkhoma Mission Hospital. Within hours, Dorothy was screened, operated on, and her sight was restored.

Dorothy has since started a small business selling groundnut flour and firewood. She told us: "I can buy books and pens for my grandchildren... when we have extra profit we buy food... My life has changed after regaining sight!"



CBM UK's See the Way Malawi project was funded by donations and match funding from the UK government through UK Aid Match.



"My inspiration to specialise in cataract surgery stems from my personal experience. When I was young, my grandfather had blinding cataracts. As his caregiver, I witnessed the challenges he faced daily. One day, my uncle took him to a medical facility in Nairobi for surgery. Seeing him regain his sight and independence was inspiring. My grandfather's journey ignited my passion for helping others overcome vision challenges."

## **Education for all**

There are 240 million children with disabilities in the world, and they are among the most likely to be out of school. Without access to education, children with disabilities are more likely to grow up in poverty. We believe that every child deserves an education, an opportunity to make friends, create happy memories, and the chance of a better future.

Thanks to our supporters, and together with our fantastic local partners, we are making sure that children with disabilities are included in school. We are helping schools to adapt their buildings so that they become accessible to everyone. We are training teachers to embed truly inclusive practices in their classrooms, and we are getting out into local communities and breaking down the stigma that so often keeps children with disabilities at home.

In 2024, we launched our 'Every Girl, Everywhere' campaign, which aimed to create lasting change for girls with disabilities through the power of education.

We were proud to have Paralympian and friend of CBM, Anne Wafula Strike, join the campaign:

"I know first-hand that bright futures start at school. I was fortunate to get an education when most people would have given up on me. That's why I'm working with CBM UK because I believe every girl, no matter where they live, should be able to go to school."

## "Disability does not mean inability!"

Our Every Girl, Everywhere campaign featured the story of 10-year-old Tinotenda from Zimbabwe. She is short-sighted and used to attend a school where her condition was not recognised or understood.

"If something is far away, I can't quite see. It is very difficult for me to see, especially when I am sitting far away."


Tinotenda's life changed completely when she moved to a disability-inclusive school. Her new teacher understands how her eyesight affects her education and provides lots of support to make sure she can read and be included in class as much as possible.

Now Tinotenda loves learning, especially making art – she wants to be an artist when she grows up!

# **Disability inclusion**

One in six people live with a disability – that is 1.3 billion people worldwide. This number is estimated to double by 2050 with over 80% living in low- or middle-income countries, often in extreme poverty. We work to influence systemic and sustainable policy change internationally in line with the Sustainable Development Goals to Leave No One Behind.

In 2024, we attended the COP29 Climate Change Conference in Azerbaijan as an accredited observer, amplifying the voices of people with disabilities and advocating for disability-inclusive climate justice. We called upon leaders to create an official disability constituency within the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC).





## Joventina's story

We enable people with disabilities to access vital support when disasters strike, assisting with essential food, water, shelter, and healthcare. We equip hospitals, and we advise other humanitarian organisations on how to be disability-inclusive in their own programmes.

When Typhoon Trami and five successive tropical storms struck the Philippines in 2024, they caused widespread devastation, damaging over 255,000 homes and displacing more than 214,000 people. For people with disabilities, the crisis was even more severe. Damaged roads, flooding, and inaccessible shelters made it difficult to reach safety or access basic support. CBM responded by supporting affected communities in the aftermath and helping people like Joventina prepare for future emergencies.

Joventina, a community-based rehabilitation volunteer, is a mother to a son with a disability and carer for her newborn granddaughter. With CBM's support, she plays a vital role in preparing her community for disasters and advocates for inclusive emergency responses, such as an accessible early warning system, to ensure no one is left behind when disaster strikes.

## Isabelle's story

When Isabelle began losing her sight to cataracts at just two years old, her parents worried she would miss out on school. But everything changed when they heard about a CBM-supported eye care project, made possible by our supporters.

Thanks to surgery, Isabelle's sight has been restored. Today, she's thriving – playing, learning, and enjoying being with her friends. Her parents are filled with hope, knowing that sight loss is no longer a barrier.




